

JOHN MAASS

John Maass is from Fairfield, Virginia. He received a B.A. in history from [Washington & Lee University](#), in [Lexington](#), Va. in 1987. After serving several years as a transportation officer in the U.S. Army Reserves (80th Div.) and a 14-year career with [Progressive Insurance](#), he received a Master of Arts in History in 2002 from [UNC Greensboro](#). At the Ohio State University, his primary field of study was Early U.S. History, with minor fields in Native American and Military history. He completed a dissertation on Revolutionary War North Carolina, 1776-1789, and was awarded the Ph.D. 2007.

He was a member of the "Project History Committee," of the [Camden Battlefield Preservation Project](#), has appeared on the History Channel, and most recently was the first Tyree-Lamb Fellow at the Society of the Cincinnati in Washington (March 2007). An article based upon 2 chapters of his dissertation will appear in the [North Carolina Historical Review](#) in July, focusing on the Tories in the state at the end of the Revolutionary conflict. In addition, he will also have one chapter in a collection of essays on Gen. Nathanael Greene and the Revolution in the South, to be published late in 2008.

John lives with his family in Fairfax County, Virginia, near Mt. Vernon. He is now an historian with the [US Army Center of Military History](#) at Ft. McNair, in D.C., currently working on a monograph on urban warfare in Iraq.
